ECHO counselors assisted the school by conducting grief education and counseling, as well as providing continued ongoing support.



Each loss deeply impacted the CJ community. Leo was a part of the class of 2025 and had found his place in the CJ community through his desire to serve others. His zeal and vibrancy helped him to build community in the class of 2025. Ms. J established the Cuvilly program at CJ, which addresses and meets numerous student learning needs. Through Cuvilly and her presence at CJ, Ms. J left a lasting impact on hundreds of CJ students, past and present. Ann Szabo was the Alumni Relations Coordinator at CJ and formed lifelong relationships and community with students, faculty, and staff. Ann left a legacy of love and kindness to CJ.

CJ experienced and still experiences an outpouring of love from many of the schools in the Dayton area. Archbishop Alter High School donated lunches for faculty and staff of CJ. St.Christopher School sent pictures of their students spelling out Leo's name to symbolize their solidarity with CJ. CJ is grateful for the massive outpouring of support during these challenging months.

Looking Back In 2021

- ➤ House Bill 123 passed the 133rd Ohio General Assembly and was signed into law by Governor Mike DeWine on December 21, 2020. In summary, this Safety and Violence Education Students (SAVE Students) Act improved the school emergency management procedures. It requires all schools to provide yearly training covering suicide awareness and violence prevention
- ➤ Virtual learning was optional for students. St. Benedict the Moor offered two instruction plans in 2020-2021 (Model A and Model B). Model A consisted of in-person/in building learning. Model B continued with remote learning because of the Covid-19 pandemic.
- > Students/staff began the 2021-2022 school year with in-person classes. Masks are required and body temperatures cannot be 100 or above at the school.
- > Student enrollment increased from 139 at end of 2021 Quarter 4 to 200 students in the new 2021-2022 school year
